CHILDREN'S LITURGY

Corpus Christi Church pre-Covid ran a liturgy group every Sunday at 11.30am Mass. The aim is to resume service to support our young children in having a productive, supportive and friendly experience at Mass, where they learn about Jesus and the Gospels in an age-related way. Ultimately we want our children to want to come to church.

We are looking to expand our team of catechists and are looking for volunteers to join our existing group of committed volunteers. NO PRIOR EXPERIENCE IS REQUIRED. We are able to train anyone who wants to be involved. You will be required to undergo a DBS application as all volunteer roles where adults are working in regulated activities with children require this under safeguarding protocols.

If you enjoy working with young children Foundation to Year 2, have a passion for spreading God's Good News and enjoy working in a team, this is the role for you. As well as training, we will offer you support and a warm welcome.

Why do we want to expand our team? Quite simply the more adults we have the less burden lies on those in the team and we can ensure consistency of provision throughout the year. We offer the liturgy every Sunday in term time only, so there are no commitments during school holiday periods. We run a rota so no one finds themselves leading every week. THE LITURGICAL CALENDAR THIS WEEK . . .

Monday is the **Memorial of St Alphonsus Liguori** – almost 300 years ago, St Alphonsus founded the Redemptorist Fathers near Naples. He became famous both as a preacher and as a writer, especially on moral theology. He composed a number of hymns, including ‘O Bread of heaven’ and ‘O Mother blest’.

Tuesday is the **Memorial of St Eusebius of Vercelli** – a fourth century Sardinian and champion of the doctrine of the divinity of Jesus, refuting the Arian heresy. He died in 370.

Thursday is the **Memorial of St John Vianney** – the Curé of Ars, Patron Saint of Parish Priests. Like his Divine Master, St John hated sin, but loved the sinner.

Friday is the **Memorial of the Dedication of the Basilica of St Mary Major** - this feast honours Our Lady and the famous church built in her honour in Rome 1500 years ago – *Santa Maria Maggiore*. The site on which it was built is said to have been indicated by a miraculous, isolated fall of snow there in (the heat of a Roman) August.

Pope Francis, from the *Angelus Address*, St Peter’s Square, 4 August 2019 Eighteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time

Jesus tells the parable of the foolish rich man who believes he is happy because he has had the good fortune to reap an exceptional harvest and he feels secure thanks to the goods he has accumulated ... It is a beautiful parable that teaches us a great deal. The narrative comes to the fore in the contrast between what the rich man plans for himself and what God plans for him instead.

The rich man puts three considerations before his soul, that is, himself: the accumulated goods, the many years that these goods appear to ensure him, and thirdly tranquility and unrestrained enjoyment (cf v. 19). But the word that God addresses to him nullifies his plans. Instead of “many years”, God points to the immediacy of “this night; tonight you will die”. Instead of the “enjoyment of life”, He presents him with “surrendering his life; you will render your life to God” with the ensuing judgment. Regarding the reality of the ample goods accumulated on which the rich man had based everything, it becomes shrouded in sarcasm by the question: “and the things you have prepared, whose will they be?” (v. 20). Let us think about quarrels over inheritance, many family quarrels. And how many people; we all know some stories about many people, who turn up at the time of death: nephews, grandchildren come around to see: “what is my share?”, and they cart everything away. It is within this contrast that the term “fool” – because he thinks about things that he believes to be concrete but that are fantasy – with which God addresses this man, is justified. He is foolish because in practice he has denied God, he has not taken Him into account.

The end of the parable as recounted by the Evangelist is uniquely effective: “So is he who lays up treasure for himself, and is not rich toward God” (v. 21). It is a warning which reveals the horizon towards which we are called to look. Material goods are necessary - they are goods! - but they are a means to live honestly and in sharing with the neediest. Today, Jesus invites us to consider that wealth can enslave the heart and distract it from the true treasure which is in heaven. Saint Paul also reminds us of this in today’s second reading. It says “seek the things that are above.... Set your minds on things that are above, not on things that are on earth” (Col 3:1-2).

It is absolutely ideal for any young adult committed to discovering more about their Catholic faith, and living that faith in an environment of community, service to young people, retreat leadership, energy and joy. The year offers practical and social skills, and is often a pathway to chaplaincy, teaching, or further avenues of Youth Ministry within the Church.
