Pope Francis, Angelus Address, St Peter's Square, 1 September 2019

In the This Sunday's Gospel passage (cf. Lk 14:7-14) shows us Jesus participating in a feast in the house of one of the head Pharisees. Jesus watches and observes how the guests run, make haste to get the best seats. It is rather common behaviour in our time too, and not only when we are invited to lunch: one frequently seeks a place of honour in order to assert a presumed superiority over others. In reality this race to the forefront harms both civil and ecclesial communities because it destroys fraternity. We all know these people: social climbers who always clamber upwards in order to move up, up ... They harm fraternity, they damage fraternity. Faced with this scene, Jesus recounts two short parables.

The first parable is addressed to *one who is invited* to a feast and Jesus exhorts him not to "sit down in a place of honour, lest a more eminent man than you be invited by him; and he who invited you both will come, and say to you, 'Please, move back, give place to this man'". An embarrassment! And "then you will begin with shame to take the lowest place" (cf. vv. 8-9). Jesus instead teaches us to behave in the opposite way: "when you are invited, go and sit in the lowest place, so that when your host comes he may say to you, 'Friend, go up higher'" (v. 10). Thus, we should not seek the attention and regard of others on our own initiative but, if anything, let others offer them to us. Jesus always shows us the way of humility — we must learn the way of humility! — because it is the most authentic way, which also allows one to enjoy authentic relationships ...

In the second parable, Jesus addresses *the one who invites* and, referring to the method of selecting guests, says to him: "when you give a feast, invite the poor, the maimed, the lame, the blind, and you will be blessed, because they cannot repay you" (vv. 13-14). Here too, Jesus goes completely against the tide, manifesting as always, the logic of God the Father. And he also adds the key by which to interpret this discourse of his. And what is the key? A promise: if you do this, you "will be repaid at the resurrection of the just" (v. 14). This means that those who behave in this way will receive divine compensation, far superior to human repayment: I do this favour for you expecting you to do one for me. No, this is not Christian. Humble generosity is Christian. Indeed, human repayment usually distorts relationships, making them "commercial" by bringing personal interest into a relationship that should be generous and free. Instead, Jesus encourages *selfless generosity*, to pave our way toward a much greater joy, the joy of partaking in the very love of God who awaits us, all of us, at the heavenly banquet.

May the Virgin Mary, "humble beyond all creatures and more exalted" (Dante, *Paradiso*, xxxiii, 2), help us to recognize ourselves as we are, that is, small; and to give joyfully, without repayment.

MUSIC DURING HOLY COMMUNION

A setting of the text of the *Agnus Dei* (Lamb of God) from the *Missa Surrexit pastor bonus* composed by Lupus Hellinck 1493/4-1541). Ordained priest in 1518, he spent most of his career in Bruges becoming, in 1523, succentor (one who assists with the music in the liturgy) of the major church of St Donatien where he remained until his death eighteen years later. He wrote a dozen settings of the Mass and at least twenty motets, some German chorales and secular songs in both French and Flemish. For one who was a priest in the Catholic Church, he seems to have been sympathetic to Reformation ideas and, as one writer comments: 'the existence of a son (for whom he made provision in his Will) does not indicate perfect conformity with the requirements on Catholic priests'.

THE LITURGICAL CALENDAR THIS WEEK . . .

Monday is the **Diocesan Memorial of St Sebbi, king of the East Saxons** – after thirty peaceful years as king, he received the monastic habit at London, died shortly afterwards and was buried in Old St Paul's.

Wednesday is the **National Feast of St Gregory the Great, pope and teacher of the faith** – a truly outstanding leader of the Church. It is said that he was captivated by the sight of a group of blond-haired people from England, on sale in the slave market. When told that they were Angles, he is supposed to have remarked: 'They are not Angles, but Angels'. In 596 he sent Augustine and forty Benedictine monks to convert these English people – Augustine becoming the first Archbishop of Canterbury. A pioneer of liturgical reform, the style of singing known as Gregorian Chant is named after him (though it was written many centuries after he died).

Thursday is the **National Memorial of St Cuthbert, monk and bishop** – a monk at Melrose and at Ripon; following the Synod of Whitby, he was asked to go as Prior to Lindisfarne under its new Benedictine Rule. In 685 he was ordained abbot-bishop. He died in 687 and his tomb became a popular pilgrimage shrine. In the ninth century, Viking raids led to an end of monastic life at Lindisfarne and in 875 his shrine was transported across the north until it reached Durham in 995. There the shrine became one of the most frequented in medieval Europe. At the Reformation his shrine was destroyed and his body re-buried on the same site, where it remains to this day.
